

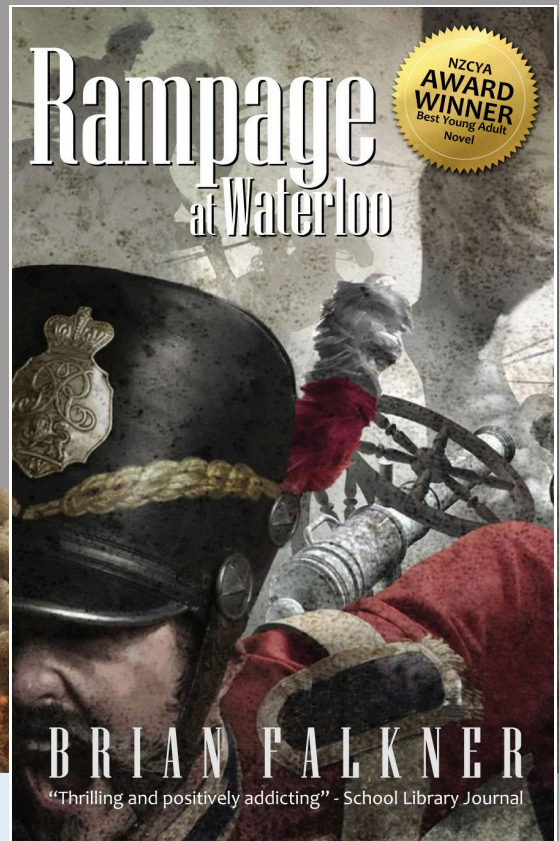

## Synopsis

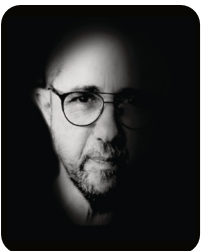

## Activities

### Night

#### Exercise:

Write a news article about the attack.

#### Questions:

- How does the presence of dinosaurs change the tone of the story?

### Ligny

#### Exercise:

Map out the key locations mentioned in the battle scenes.

#### Questions:

- How does Falkner describe the chaos of battle?
- What strategic importance does Ligny hold in the narrative?

### Retreat

#### Exercise:

Research real medical procedures carried out in field hospitals during these times.

#### Questions:

- Why is Willem unable to search for the ring and why does he initially refuse Cosette's help?
- What does this chapter mean for the developing relationship between Willem and Cosette?

### Under the Bridge

#### Exercise:

Draw a diagram of the bridge scene, including character placements.

#### Questions:

- How does Captain de Lessart's internal conflict enhance the story?
- What does the bridge symbolize in this chapter?

### The Ruien

#### Exercise:

Create a survival plan for navigating the sewers.

#### Questions:

- How do the characters demonstrate resourcefulness in this chapter?
- What does the sewer setting reveal about the conditions of war?

### Mont-Saint-Jean

#### Exercise:

Draw a map of the Battle of Waterloo, using real historical accounts

#### Questions:

- Through Jack's eyes, the battle is depicted as a colourful garden with gaudy, waltzing flowers. Why is this horrific and bloody conflict described in such a way?
- What was the real outcome of the Battle of Waterloo, and why?



## Discussion Questions

- How does the author blend historical facts with fictional elements in the novel?
- What are the key motivations for Willem's actions throughout the story?
- How do the characters' experiences in the novel reflect the broader themes of war and survival?
- In what ways does the presence of dinosaurs change the dynamics of the Battle of Waterloo?

What motivates Francois to take the actions he takes in the novel particularly in relation to Jean.



## Essay Topics

- Explore the impact of historical accuracy and creative liberty in "Rampage at Waterloo."
- Evaluate the ethical dilemmas faced by characters in the novel and their relevance to real-world scenarios.
- Examine the portrayal of young characters, such as Willem and the young lieutenant Frost, in the novel. What commentary does Falkner provide on the role and experiences of youth in wartime?
- Discuss the cultural and social impacts of the Napoleonic Wars as depicted in "Rampage at Waterloo."
